NOTE 1 – DESCRIPTION OF ORGANIZATION AND BUSINESS OPERATIONS

Oriental Snatch LLC (the “Company”) was formed in Wisconsin on expre. The Company was organized to produce, release, and distribute a feature motion picture entitled *Oriental Snatch*, from which it expects to generate revenue through box office, distribution, licensing, and merchandising.

The Company’s principal place of business is located in Whitefish Bay, Wisconsin, and it intends to distribute its content in both domestic and international markets.

The Company plans to conduct a Regulation CF crowdfunding campaign in 2026 to raise capital to support development, production, and operating activities.

Risks & Uncertainties:

The Company’s financial instruments that are exposed to concentrations of credit risk primarily consist of its cash and cash equivalents. The Company places its cash and cash equivalents with financial institutions of high credit worthiness. The Company’s management plans to assess the financial strength and credit worthiness of any parties to which it extends funds, and as such, it believes that any associated credit risk exposures are limited.

Substantial Doubt about the Entity’s Ability to Continue as a Going Concern:

The accompanying balance sheet has been prepared on a going concern basis, which means that the entity expects to continue its operations and meet its obligations in the normal course of business during the next twelve months. Conditions and events creating the doubt include the fact that the Company has not commenced principal operations and will likely realize losses prior to generating positive working capital for an unknown period of time. The Company’s management has evaluated this condition and plans to fund operations and the production of its motion picture through additional capital contributions and a planned Regulation CF crowdfunding campaign. However, there is no guarantee of success in these efforts. The financial statements do not include any adjustments that might result from the outcome of this uncertainty.

NOTE 2 – SUMMARY OF SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Presentation

The Company’s financial statements are prepared in accordance with U.S. generally accepted accounting principles (“GAAP”). The Company’s fiscal year ends on December 31. The Company has no interest in variable interest entities and no predecessor entities.

Use of Estimates and Assumptions

In preparing these unaudited financial statements in conformity with U.S. GAAP, the Company’s management makes estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements and the reported expenses during the reporting period.

Making estimates requires management to exercise significant judgment. It is at least reasonably possible that the estimate of the effect of a condition, situation or set of circumstances that existed at the date of the financial statements, which management considered in formulating its estimate, could change in the near term due to one or more future confirming events. Accordingly, the actual results could differ significantly from those estimates.

Fair Value of Financial Instruments

FASB Accounting Standards Codification (ASC) 820 "*Fair Value Measurements and Disclosures*" establishes a three-tier fair value hierarchy, which prioritizes the inputs in measuring fair value. The hierarchy prioritizes the inputs into three levels based on the extent to which inputs used in measuring fair value are observable in the market.

These tiers include:

Level 1: Observable inputs such as quoted prices (unadjusted) in active markets for identical assets or liabilities.

Level 2: Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability, either directly or indirectly. These include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets and quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in markets that are not active.

Level 3: Unobservable inputs in which little or no market data exists, therefore developed using estimates and assumptions developed by us, which reflect those that a market participant would use.

There were no material items that were measured at fair value as of December 31, 2025.

Cash and Cash Equivalents

The Company considers all short-term investments with an original maturity of three months or less when purchased to be cash equivalents. As of December 31, 2025, the Company had no cash or cash equivalents.

Revenue Recognition

The Company recognizes revenue from the sale of products and services in accordance with ASC 606, "Revenue from Contracts with Customers" following the five steps procedure:

Step 1: Identify the contract(s) with customers

Step 2: Identify the performance obligations in the contract

Step 3: Determine the transaction price

Step 4: Allocate the transaction price to performance obligations

Step 5: Recognize revenue when or as performance obligations are satisfied

The Company has not yet generated revenue as it is in the development stage. The Company expects to generate revenues by selling, licensing, or distributing its completed motion picture to distributors and sales agents in various geographic territories and media markets. Payments are expected to be received under distribution or licensing agreements, typically as fixed fees or a share of gross receipts. The Company's primary performance obligation will be the delivery of the completed motion picture and related rights in accordance with the terms of each agreement.

General and Administrative

General and administrative expenses consist primarily of formation and organizational costs incurred in connection with establishing the Company and preparing for future operations. The Company does not yet have employees or significant ongoing administrative activities.

Income Taxes

The Company is a pass-through entity therefore any income tax expense or benefit is the responsibility of the company's owners. As such, no provision for income tax is recognized on the Statement of Operations.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

The FASB issues Accounting Standards Updates (ASUs) to amend the authoritative literature in ASC. There have been a number of ASUs to date that amend the original text of ASC. Management believes that those issued to date either (i) provide supplemental guidance, (ii) are technical corrections, (iii) are not applicable to us or (iv) are not expected to have a significant impact on our financial statements.

NOTE 3 – RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS

The Company follows ASC 850, “Related Party Disclosures,” for the identification of related parties and disclosure of related party transactions. No transactions require disclosure.

NOTE 4 – COMMITMENTS, CONTINGENCIES, COMPLIANCE WITH LAWS AND REGULATIONS

The Company is not currently involved with or knows of any pending or threatening litigation against it or any of its officers. Further, the Company is currently complying with all relevant laws and regulations. The Company does not have any long-term commitments or guarantees.

NOTE 5 – LIABILITIES AND DEBT

As of December 31, 2025, the Company had no outstanding liabilities or debt.

NOTE 6 – EQUITY

The Company is a single-member limited liability company wholly owned and managed by Ryland Tews.

NOTE 7 – SUBSEQUENT EVENTS

The Company has evaluated events subsequent to December 31, 2025 to assess the need for potential recognition or disclosure in this report. Such events were evaluated through April 20, 2026, the date these financial statements were available to be issued.

The Company closed its Regulation Crowdfunding campaign on Wefunder in January 2026 and received approximately \$163,200 of investor proceeds under a revenue-sharing, debt-like financing arrangement; this financing represents a nonrecognized subsequent event under ASC 855 and will be initially recorded as a financing liability in 2026, with no adjustment to the 2025 financial statements.
